From 19 to 23 January, our Middle School community came together to celebrate Languages Week, a joyful and engaging week dedicated to the many foreign and mother tongue languages spoken and learned across our school. Guided by this year's theme, "Languages Connect Us," students explored how languages help us communicate, understand different cultures, and build meaningful connections with others. Throughout the week, students participated enthusiastically in a range of activities during their language classes, including Languages Class Swap, Culture Show and Tell, Language Hunt, and the Mini Language Quiz. These activities encouraged curiosity, collaboration, and a deeper appreciation of linguistic diversity. One highlight of the week was the Language Hunt, where students explored the campus during break times, discovering short phrases displayed in different languages and recording them in their Language Passports. It was wonderful to see students actively engaging with languages beyond the classroom. Languages Week concluded with a shared celebration in the auditorium, where each language hosted a stall. Students moved freely between activities, taking part in hands-on language and cultural experiences such as completing a quiz about Sweden, learning Italian hand gestures, and kicking a football at the Brazilian stall. 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Science Spotlight: Strange Happenings and Scientific Inquiry!

If you heard “singing spoons” or saw “haunted mist” drifting from the Middle School laboratories last week, don’t worry—it was simply our Grade 6 scientists diving deep into their Inquiry into Matter unit! During Week 2, students moved beyond the textbook to observe the fascinating properties of Dry Ice (solid carbon dioxide). This hands-on experience allowed them to witness sublimation—a rare change of state where a solid turns directly into a gas.

How Students Solved Complex Problems Through Experimentation:

By investigating “strange happenings,” students applied systematic inquiry to explain the behavior of matter. Key experiments included:

- The “Hovercraft Effect”: Students explored low-friction motion, observing how gas cushions affect movement.
- Self-Inflating & Heavy Balloons: These tasks required students to analyze how gas expansion and density differ from common air.
- Singing Spoons & Frothy Beakers: Students used these sensory observations to hypothesize how energy transfers between different states of matter.



By exploring the key concept of Change, they are building scientific models to explain phenomena that aren’t often seen in everyday life. Throughout this unit, students aren’t just memorizing facts; they are seeking answers to complex Inquiry Questions:

- How does the arrangement of particles account for the properties of matter?
- Can the particulate model account for all behaviors of matter?

By connecting these experiments to Scientific Models, our Grade 6 students are developing the critical thinking skills needed to apply classroom knowledge to real-world contexts.

Middle School Service Club

The MS Service Club was active again in the month of December. In our visit to the NTUC Nursing Home, the students performed traditional seasonal sung carols, provided craft activities such as making a simple snow globe using paper plates and played a highly entertaining game of bingo linked to the theme of Christmas. As a finishing touch, a morning tea was provided and some warm jackets and coats, donated by the OFS Middle School teaching staff, were handed over alongside some small gifts such as mini portable radios for resident use. Also in the month, the club paid a visit to ‘Willing Hearts’ in Joo Chiat. Willing Hearts is a local NGO that provides over 10,000 meals a day to marginalised people in Singapore. During the visit, the students involved were able to see up close the daily hard work that the small but dedicated groups of employed staff working alongside a myriad of volunteer cooks, meal preparation staff and the fruit, meat and vegetable sorting workers in action. The students were given a dedicated tour of the facility to see how each element contributes to the daily meal delivery service and then got involved in some food preparation work of their own through the supervised chopping up of large amounts of vegetables that would be used in the meals being sent out that day.
